From the Rabbi's Desk . . .

Responding to the Economic Crisis

On the first day of Rosh Hashanah this year, I spoke about the current state of the Jewish community. I raised the question of how we as a community can respond to the current economic situation, especially as it affects members of the Temple of Aaron. I am proud to say that a number of you reached out to volunteer to help devise a plan of action.

This action, like all that we take as Jews. is based in our tradition's understanding of how we can best connect with each other. The act of giving to those in need (tzedaka) has many guiding principals. The best developed comes from the great twelfth-century physician and philosopher Maimonides, who notes in his book Mishne Torah: "There are eight degrees of charity, each one higher than the next. The highest degree, exceeded by none, is that of the person who assists a poor Jew by providing him [sic] with a gift or a loan, or by entering into a partnership with him, or helping him find work; in a word, by putting him in a position where he can dispense with other people's aid." All of our efforts have this in mind, giving Tzedaka to the Eighth Degree.

The work synagogue volunteers have done so far can be understood in several categories: providing for basic needs in the short term; offering support to help with legal and financial matters; and providing resources for emotional support. Our intention is to enable Temple members to help one another, while also taking full advantage of professional resources in the larger community.



On Rosh Hashanah, I used the image of the tzedaka puske as it was used in the small, isolated Jewish communities of 100 years ago. The box was passed around anonymously. Those who were in need would take from it and those who could contribute, did. Privacy was essential to ensuring that nobody was embarrassed when they needed support. In this way, both the economic and the emotional needs were met. We continue this effort today. We are striving to give Tzedaka to the Eighth Degree.

Torah U'Mitzvot Project — 7th Grade

Throughout this year the 7th Grade Religious School students have studied various Mitzvot – Commandments. The Torah U'Mitzvot Project gave students the opportunity to study their B'nai Mitzvah parshiot within the context of a mitzvah and to educate members of the community about a Jewish charitable organization that relates to their parasha. The students worked one-on-one with faculty to study and analyze their individual B'nai Mitzvah parasha. Students then researched and chose a Jewish organization they wanted to highlight to the community which may be connected to the themes in their portion. On Sunday, February 13, 2011, a special event was held in the Leifman Chapel during which each student presented family and friends with an oral presentation that explained in depth his or her parasha and how he or she feels it relates to the organization of his or her choice. Everyone then moved to Stein Hall to view each student's creative display, which served to further educate the community about the organization and the work it does. Students from the other Religious School classes also had the opportunity to view the displays and interact with the 7th grade student creators.

Even then the young heroine took her time in doing so, waiting until a second banquet before telling the King her true identity as Hadassah. Donald and Helen Swartz Israel Scholarship Fund Increases Grants

In 2000, Donald and Helen Swartz, along with their children, created an Israel endowment fund. The goal of the fund is to encourage bar/bat mitzvah students to take advantage of approved educational trips to Israel. A \$500.00 scholarship was available to students between the ages of 15 to 21.

Over the past 10 years, the costs of an Israel experience have increased dramatically. With that in mind, the Swartz Family has chosen to re-shape the program and award each student with a grant of \$1,500.00.

"Helen and I have always been supporters of the State of Israel and have seen how a trip to the holy land can dramatically affect young people's lives," said Donald.



As part of the grant, students agree to volunteer 20 hours with a Jewish organization within 12 months of their return, and share their Israeli experiences with students in our religious school. In addition, students and their families are encouraged to make donations to the fund in the future so that other students can take advantage of this very special program.

The change from an endowment fund to a restricted fund means that at some point 100 percent of the funds will be used.

Congregants should keep in mind that there are programs operated by the UJFC, with the assistance of the Elliott Belzer Family, with available scholarship funds.

Donald and Helen have been pillars of our congregation, said Temple President Michael Saxon. Donald served as President of our congregation and Helen was active in Sisterhood, Religious School and Annual Fund Raisers. We will forever be grateful to them and their family for their ongoing support of the Temple of Aaron and our families.


Practices Change and Synagogue Adjusts

At Temple of Aaron, we operate as a nonprofit corporation under Minnesota law. Our Bylaws are the rules by which we govern ourselves as an organization.

On October 19, 2010, the Board of Directors of Temple of Aaron completed a comprehensive review and restatement of the synagogue's Bylaws and voted to call a membership meeting to approve the restatement.

The objective of this Bylaws restatement is to:

- Modernize our rules of governance, but also preserve and reflect our heritage
- Simplify and clarify rules and processes to make governance easier and more understandable for members and Board alike
- Not be overly legalistic or prescriptive unless necessary to comply with a legal mandate or to avoid liability
- Eliminate practices or requirements that we don't and won't follow or that create unnecessary or unreasonable obligations or burdens
- . Be more inclusive and trusting
- Continue what works, but codify such longstanding practice in understandable terms

The proposed changes require membership approval. We will hold a meeting at 10:00 a.m., March 6, 2011 to obtain approval by the membership of the Restated Bylaws. The Board will provide advance notice of the meeting and a proxy process to submit votes "absentee." Watch for more details and the official meeting notice in future editions of the *Aaronion* and through the synagogue's other communication media.

We are looking forward to discussing how members of Temple of Aaron can work across lines of faith and race to address urgent economic justice issues of our day: Foreclosure Prevention and Fair Lending. According to Howard Goldman, who is co-hosting the meeting with Bill and Mary, "The foreclosure crisis is playing out right here in St. Paul. The Foreclosure Prevention Committee may be the last hope for many homeowners. We are off to a good start, but we have a lot of work to do."

Temple of Aaron members are invited to this meeting to learn more about what they can do to help stem the foreclosure crisis in St. Paul. In the coming months, Temple of Aaron members will have opportunities to work with Frogtown residents (the coalition's area of focus) on several projects:

- Teams of volunteers will visit struggling homeowners door to door with information about free resources to prevent foreclosures and to know their rights as tenants.
- Volunteers may participate in negotiation meetings with bank representatives to urge them to commit to more loan modifications, a more efficient and transparent process for homeowners, and other kinds of support for hard-hit communities.



- Volunteers can write letters and make calls to lenders on behalf of homeowners facing foreclosure.
- There will be some legislative advocacy opportunities, locally and nationally, around fair lending issues.

Jewish Community Action Presents the 100th Anniversary of the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory Fire Commemorative Series: Then and Now — Immigrants, Workers and the Search for Justice

On March 25, 1911, fire broke out in New York City's Triangle Shirtwaist Factory and 146 workers, mostly young Jewish and Italian immigrant women, died. Exit doors had been locked, elevators failed, fire escapes crumbled, and the fire department's ladders did not reach high enough. In the aftermath of this disaster, the owners were acquitted of responsibility by a jury. But, immigrant women garment workers across the city built up the International Ladies'

Garment Workers' Union (ILGWU) and negotiated economic and physical security, while the city government enacted new regulations about workplace safety and inspections.

The Triangle Shirtwaist Factory Fire became a major memorial day in U.S. labor history. This spring across the United States, commemorative events will mark the 100th anniversary of one of America's worst industrial tragedies. Jewish Community Action, together with a range of historical, educational, labor, immigrant rights, and social justice organizations, will mark the anniversary with a series of events in March, April and May:
